We are in an "outright war" that is "expanding and metastasizing." p. 6 SP: "Lay out a framework for understanding the human condition by modern science – who we are, where we came from, what our challenges are, and how we can meet them."

R: A bold and vigorous attempt to counteract negativism accompanied with post modernism of our time. SP is generally successful. More may follow on the dynamics of enlightenment (18th century), its growth to rationalism and industrial revolution (19th century) by modernity and postmodernism (20th century). When we reassert enlightenment, we may think of the dialectics of reason and humanism. First we need to deepen our understanding, then we may need to convince the public and the world leaders. It could be again dystopia.

R: Some are magical beliefs (unicorn) but most are related to God's power (geocentrism, explanation of nature, God designed nature for medicine) and some are folklores (ointment on dagger, alchemist gold)

p. 12 Government is human invention and instition

In this way of thinking, government is not a divine fiat to reign, a synonym for "society," or an avatar of the national, religious, or racial soul. It is a human invention, tacitly agreed to in a social contract, designed to enhance the welfare of citizens by coordinating their behavior and discouraging selfish acts that may be tempting to every individual but leave everyone worse off. Among the powers of government is meting out punishment, and writers such as Montesquieu, Cesare Beccaria, and the American founders thought afresh about the government's license to harm its citizens.¹⁷ Criminal punishment, they argued, is not a mandate to implement cosmic justice but part of an incentive structure that discourages antisocial acts without causing more suffering than it deters.
